From the Pastor

September 1973 – Psalm 70

Make haste, o god, to deliver me; make haste to help me, O Lord. Let them be ashamed and confounded that seek after my soul: let them be turned backward, and put to confusion, that desire my hurt. Let them be turned back for a reward of their shame that say, Aha, aha. Let all those that seek thee rejoice and be glad in thee: and let such as love thy salvation say continually, Let God be magnified. But I am poor and needy: make haste unto me, O God: thou art my help and my deliverer; O Lord, make no tarrying. (Psalm 70 KJV)

I was only eighteen in September 1973 when I left my Orangeburg, South Carolina hometown. I began my freshman year at Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, North Carolina. I was anxious about being away from home even though I had attended Upward Bound (a college preparatory program on the campus of Claflin University). However, the blue book time came for mid-term, and I did not do very well on my test. Immediately, I called my sister, Carolyn, who prayed and advised me on many things about Jesus Christ and faith. I witnessed her unique gifts and how she helped my high school friend during his speech at our graduation. She gave him some Biblical scriptures to read, which was like a miracle for him. She also helped a lot of people in the community spiritually. Consequently, she told me to read my Bible daily and gave me Psalm 70, the King James Version. I read it constantly and the entire Bible and finished all sixty-six books three times.

My roommates saw that I was reading my little white Bible in my room, the library, and the gym and carrying it daily with my other books. Many of the students began to call me negative names, but it did not bother me because I was blessed, and all my blue book tests did a complete 180-degree turnaround. I felt blessed and more confident about my future as a freshman at Johnson C. Smith University.

Reaching out to my sister and her giving me Psalm 70 was truly a blessing. Over my theological studies, I have done my exegesis and hermeneutics research on what King David may have been experiencing. I have gained knowledge and wisdom over the last fifty-one years from receiving this special holy anointing scripture that was earmarked for me during my struggles and afflictions.

When God has given me saints to help guide and direct my path, I pause and "O, I give humble thanks and praise to the Trinity; God the Father God the Son and God the Holy Ghost..." I have been in the ministry for over 30 years, and my hallmark scripture is Psalm 70. Furthermore, I have recommended this scripture to hundreds of people at the churches I have served and others.

In short, we are our brethren's keepers. Jesus had blessed me to have a spiritual sister that helped me along the way. Therefore, I am compelled to help others along my path. I challenge you to read and meditate on Psalm 70 daily and I believe it will make a difference in your life.

There is one body, but it has many parts. But all its many parts make up one body. It is the same with Christ. We were all baptized by one Holy Spirit. And so we are formed into one body. It didn't matter whether we were Jews or Gentiles, slaves or free people. We were all given the same Spirit to drink. So the body is not made up of just one part. It has many parts.

Suppose the foot says, "I am not a hand. So I don't belong to the body." By saying this, it cannot stop being part of the body. And suppose the ear says, "I am not an eye. So I don't belong to the body." By saying this, it cannot stop being part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, how could it hear? If the whole body were an ear, how could it smell? God has placed each part in the body just as he wanted it to be. If all the parts were the same, how could there be a body? As it is, there are many parts. But there is only one body.

The eye can't say to the hand, "I don't need you!" The head can't say to the feet, "I don't need you!" In fact, it is just the opposite. The parts of the

body that seem to be weaker are the ones we can't do without. The parts that we think are less important we treat with special honor. The private parts aren't shown. But they are treated with special care. The parts that can be shown don't need special care. But God has put together all the parts of the body. And he has given more honor to the parts that didn't have any. In that way, the parts of the body will not take sides. All of them will take care of one another. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it. If one part is honored, every part shares in its joy.

You are the body of Christ. Each one of you is a part of it. (1 Corinthians 12:12-27)

This scripture describes the church to a tee because it assures us that each congregation member is important. No one is more important than anyone else. All souls are needed to further the kingdom of our God through our actions, not only in the church building but throughout the week at the grocery store, school, gas station, bank, or a friend's home. Anywhere we may find ourselves during the week. Anywhere we can serve as disciples of Jesus, following His example.

We all have a part in the congregation. Do you pray for others? Do you take a meal to someone who may need it? Do you pull weeds in the churchyard? Do you serve in the worship service as an usher, liturgist, acolyte, choir member, or meet people at the door as a greeter? Do you visit a shut-in, a new mother, someone who just had surgery, or someone who may need to see a friendly smile? Do you volunteer in the community at a school, as a committee member for the city, by helping clean up our community, or visiting a rest home? These are just a few ways we can serve as the hands and feet of Christ.

Remember, no one in the church is more important than another. We are all equal in the eyes of our God. Let's continue to care for each other, love each other, and honor each other.

A violinist once performed in the New York City subway, entertaining passersby for 45 minutes. A few tossed him cash, totaling about \$30 by the time he concluded.

Little did anyone know, Joshua Bell was one of the world's best violinists. That day, he played one of the most complex musical pieces ever written on an instrument worth \$3.5 million. Indeed, a few days earlier Bell had performed a sold-out concert in Boston, where tickets averaged \$100.

Sometimes God does extraordinary things right in the middle of our ordinary lives, yet we don't notice. You're offered an opportunity you almost pass up, thinking it's not worth your time or effort. But upon taking part, you find it leads to your life's calling. Or someone crosses your path, but overlooking their worth, you brush them aside, missing out on a blessing God had for you through them.

And what about you? Do you undervalue yourself as "nothing special," just an "ordinary" person? Look closer; think again. For an ordinary baby born long ago to an ordinary couple in an ordinary stable in an ordinary town was none other than ... God's Son! And you? Why, you are also an extraordinary child of God!

The Gift of Work

Missionary and author Elisabeth Elliot considered work a gift and a blessing. Ponder the following quotes of hers as you celebrate Labor Day. How do they mesh with your own views of work?

"This job has been given to me to do. Therefore, it is a gift. Therefore, it is a privilege. Therefore, it is an offering I may make to God. Therefore, it is to be done gladly if it is done for him. Here, not somewhere else, I may learn God's way. In this job, not in some other, God looks for faithfulness."

"Work is a blessing. God has so arranged the world that work is necessary, and he gives us hands and strength to do it. The enjoyment of leisure would be nothing if we had only leisure. It is the joy of work well done that enables us to enjoy rest, just as it is the experiences of hunger and thirst that make food and drink such pleasures."

Goals for Your Church

Pastor and professor Howard Clinebell Jr. described the ideal local church as one that strives to become "a healing, growth-stimulating, redemptive organism." Each congregation, he wrote, should work to develop "a dynamic climate of mutual concern which gradually seeps into and saturates the whole fellowship."

How can your church body meet those goals? For starters, compare your mission, ministry, outreach, and attitudes to the early church.

The New Testament reveals that a fellowship of believers should engage in these activities together: worshiping (Acts 2:46-47), studying (Acts 2:42), witnessing (Acts 2:44-47; 3:9), serving (Acts 6:1-6; 20:35), loving (Hebrews 10:24), praying (Acts 1:14; 12:12), cooperating (Acts 1:11-14; 2:1; 4:23) and suffering for the sake of the gospel (Hebrews 10:32-34; Philippians 1:29).

In addition, Jesus calls New Testament believers to live joyfully (Acts 2:46; 5:40-41; 13:50-52; 16:25), courageously (Acts 4:13; 4:29; 15:26), powerfully (1 Corinthians 4:20), enthusiastically (Acts 2:43-47) and generously (Acts 2:45; 2 Corinthians 9:10-12). May the Holy Spirit equip us to heal, grow and mutually edify one another!

The Significance of Patriot Day

Three months after the 2001 terrorist attacks, Congress approved a joint resolution designating September 11 as



Patriot Day. Every year, we pause to remember the lives lost and changed on that autumn morning.

The resolution requests that each year the president issue a proclamation calling on the American people and state and local governments to observe the day with appropriate activities. Those include remembrance services, candlelight vigils, moments of silence and flying the U.S. flag at half-staff.

In his 2023 proclamation President Biden said, "Together, may we continue to demonstrate that the rights and freedoms that those terrorists sought to destroy on September 11, 2001, remain unwavering strengthened by generations of Americans who have dared all and risked all to defend, protect and preserve our democracy."

Being Christ Amid Pain

In December 2023, a tanker truck carrying 9,000 gallons of gasoline tipped on its side in Totona, Liberia. For two hours, a party atmosphere ensued as people living in poverty rushed to gather gas dripping from the vehicle. But then, the tanker suddenly exploded. Dozens of people died instantly or were severely burned. Thousands have endured deep trauma and grief. How could life go on? Where was God?

Yet, life did go on — not easily, but in this way: Medical staff and others rallied to care for all who were suffering physically and emotionally. A nearby church held comforting worship services, and its choir went to homes to sing messages of hope. Parishes and disaster-response ministries sent teams from near and far to support people through post-traumatic stress, income loss due to disability, the birth of babies whose young fathers had died in the blast, children's transition back to school and more.

These Christian caregivers and comforters couldn't bring instant, perfect healing. But by connecting with people who were grieving and struggling, they have become the presence of Christ.

Where is God? There, in the midst and aftermath of pain, working unceasingly to bring new life.
